High-performance building is integral to the *triple* bottom line solutions that strike a balance between environmental, social, and economic prosperity

 Relating to testing for lead contamination in schools with lead piping

 Relating to air filtration efficiency standards at primary and secondary education and child-care facilities

Our past advocacy successes include:

#### 85th Legislative Session

- SB 59, filed by Senator Zafferini. SECO will support state agencies in setting energy and water efficiency goals and creating plans to meet them.
- HB 1571, filed by Representative Paddie. Extends the application of Energy Savings Performance Contracts for local governments.
- HR 2090, filed by Representative Lozano. Resolution in support of green schools.

## 84th Legislative Session

- HB 1184, filed by Representative Paddie. Authorized utility cost savings and alternative fuel programs.
- HB 1736, filed by Representative Villalba. Adopted IECC 2015 energy code for residential and commercial buildings.
- HB 1902, filed by Representative Howard. Contributed to the regulation and expansion of permissable greywater use.

## 83rd Legislative Session

- SB 198, filed by Senator Watson. Allowed members of homeowner's associations the freedom to utilize water-efficient landscaping.
- SB 385, filed by Senator Carona. Gave commercial building owners the ability to fund energy and water efficiency projects through property assessments.
- SB 700, filed by Senator Hegar. Allowed certain money in the Texas Emissions Reduction Plan to fund an energy efficiency grant program for schools.
- HB 227, filed by Representative Larson. Included funding for water conservation, re-use and education as a part of 2012 State Water Plan.
- HR 1617, filed by Representative Strama. Resolution commending the Texas Chapters of the U.S. Green Building Council for promoting green building practices.
